#### **Neighbourhood Services**

#### **Public Seats**

Mark and Ryan are doing some TLC on our public seats. Some have been taken away to repair and refurbish them indoors away from the elements. We'll revert to on-site work later in the season when the weather is better.

They will also be checking if the seats meet accessibility requirements, as some of our older seats are just too low (below 400mm) and may not meet accessibility guidelines.

#### **Bus Shelters**

Officers Mark and Ryan have successfully installed stand information at Ashington Bus Station on behalf of Northumberland County Council (NCC). Working closely with NCC's bus ambassador, Bill Lynch, we are developing a strategic approach to bus shelters across Ashington, with emphasis on accessibility, comfortable seating, and improved information through timetable cabinet upgrades.

A press release detailing this initiative has been written and is currently with NCC's communications team for approval. NCC has expressed interest in highlighting this partnership as an exemplary model to encourage similar collaborative efforts with other Town and Parish Councils. While our direct responsibility is limited to bus shelter provision, we continue to extend our support to enhance broader public transport infrastructure, maintaining our commitment to upgrade 2-4 locations annually. We have applied for funding for shelters in 2025/26, and we have sought user information to prioritise the busiest shelters for accessibility, and upgrade.

#### Defibs

All defibs have been cleaned and checked.

#### Allotment General

Successful UPVC recycling days were held at North Seaton Colliery and Seaton Hirst. Huge effort by plot holders at both sites, nearly 1.5 tonnes of plastic has been recycled. This has prevented this going to landfill or staying on site and being an eyesore. Next Monday we are rolling this out at Highmarket.

Two plot holders have been relocated due to asbestos after a fire at HEE.

Asbestos to be safely removed from Seaton Hirst and High Market, contractor to visit on 11<sup>th</sup> March to assess costs.

Alan met with Ryan and Mark to consider building a manure store at North Seaton Colliery. Existing manure to be moved and fence to be reinstated.

A meeting has taken place with Bernicia Group in relation to overgrown ivy and a tree on the boundary between the Seaton Hirst allotment site and Milton Grove. We await an update from Bernicia.

Invoices have been sent for Hirst East End and Nursery Park allotment sites 1<sup>st</sup> April 2025 – 31<sup>st</sup> March 2026.

## Projects

## Ashington Cricket Club

The Ashington memorial tree project is approximately 10 weeks away from its launch date on 18<sup>th</sup> May 2025. Progress includes:

- > 63 trees from NCC have been delivered, with most planted.
- Remaining trees (1 standard and 15 smaller ones) will be planted on 15<sup>th</sup> March with Scout involvement, and County Cllrs who provided funding towards the project also invited.
- The project has reached its funding target, with contingency for any trees that may need to be replaced.
- Plaques manufactured by Falon Nameplates will be installed in alphabetical order around the cricket pitch to be completed by 25<sup>th</sup> April.

ATC's significant contributions following Stephen's support with funding applications prior to him leaving include Mark and Ryan helping with tree planting despite adverse weather conditions in February. They will also take responsibility for installing all the plaques using cement mix to secure them into the ground and will assist with installing the information board posts with NCC Highways Department's help.

An information board is being developed with historical photos and will be installed at the field's main entrance. Launch day arrangements for 18<sup>th</sup> May include speeches, a military honour guard, refreshments, and media coverage. The project aims to memorialise 177 individuals from Ashington who died during World War II.

The next meeting will be arranged for late April.

## **Doves Corner**

Progress has been made on the area enhancement project across multiple phases:

- NCC have now removed the rockery and flags as planned. I have sought confirmation regarding the optimal timing for seeding, specifically whether it would be more beneficial to complete this at the end of the entire project rather than prior to the landscaping phase.
- Mark and Ryan are prepared to proceed with their phase, including the removal of existing seats and installation of the new litter bin. The replacement seats have been ordered. However, ATC's work will be scheduled once we receive confirmation from Brambledown regarding the timeline for their phase of the project, which has been requested and is currently pending.

The full project scope remains as follows:

## Phase 1 (Northumberland County Council)

- Remove four Rockery's and infill with soil and grass seed (two large near seats and two smaller rockery's to edge of area).
- Remove redundant old paving in front of seating area and infill with soil and grass seed.

## Phase 2 (Brambledown Landscape Services)

- Remove small section of shrubbery that encroaches onto path near the rail crossing (magnet for litter and leaves).
- > Install quality paving where existing seats are situated.
- Enhance bed and existing shrubbery behind seating area and plant approximately 4 appropriate shrubs.
- Install two small, low maintenance, colourful shrub beds for insects Buddleia, Hebe etc. The beds will play off the existing floral beds in this area in front of the seating.

## Phase 3 (Ashington Town Council)

- Install two quality recycled seats with arm supports (for people with disabilities), Streetmaster Colwyn Seat (seat previously agreed by the Town Council).
- > Replace existing aging litter bin with new litter bin. Recycle existing bin if possible.

The first stage of completed tenders have been evaluated.

# Event Gate at People's Park

Following agreement last month, the gate has now been fabricated locally and will be installed when this can be scheduled.
